MTG Parliamentary Researchers Forum

A drinks reception for parliamentary staff was held on June 27th in the Old Star in Westminster. Over 20 Parliamentary advisors, senior staff and researchers attended the event and met with patients and industry members. The reception was a great opportunity to build relationships with researchers, promote greater understanding of the medical device industry and ask how we may best pursue the MTG's aims in Westminster.

Update on the unplanned admissions report

A spotlight campaign report on unplanned admissions is currently in development and due to be published later in the year. The report is looking at rates of unplanned admissions focusing on three areas: urinary tract infections, heart failure and diabetes. Initial findings suggest there are major savings to be made (approximately £1billion) in reducing unplanned admissions.

Medical Technology Week

The annual Medical Technology Awareness Week is planned for the week beginning November 16th culminating with a parliamentary reception hosted by John Pugh MP on Wednesday 18th November. The week aims to raise awareness of the role medical technology plays in the UK and the benefits to both patients and the NHS. It will bring together key stakeholders including MPs and Peers, clinicians and patients in promoting the need for better and more consistent access to medical technology across the NHS.



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
